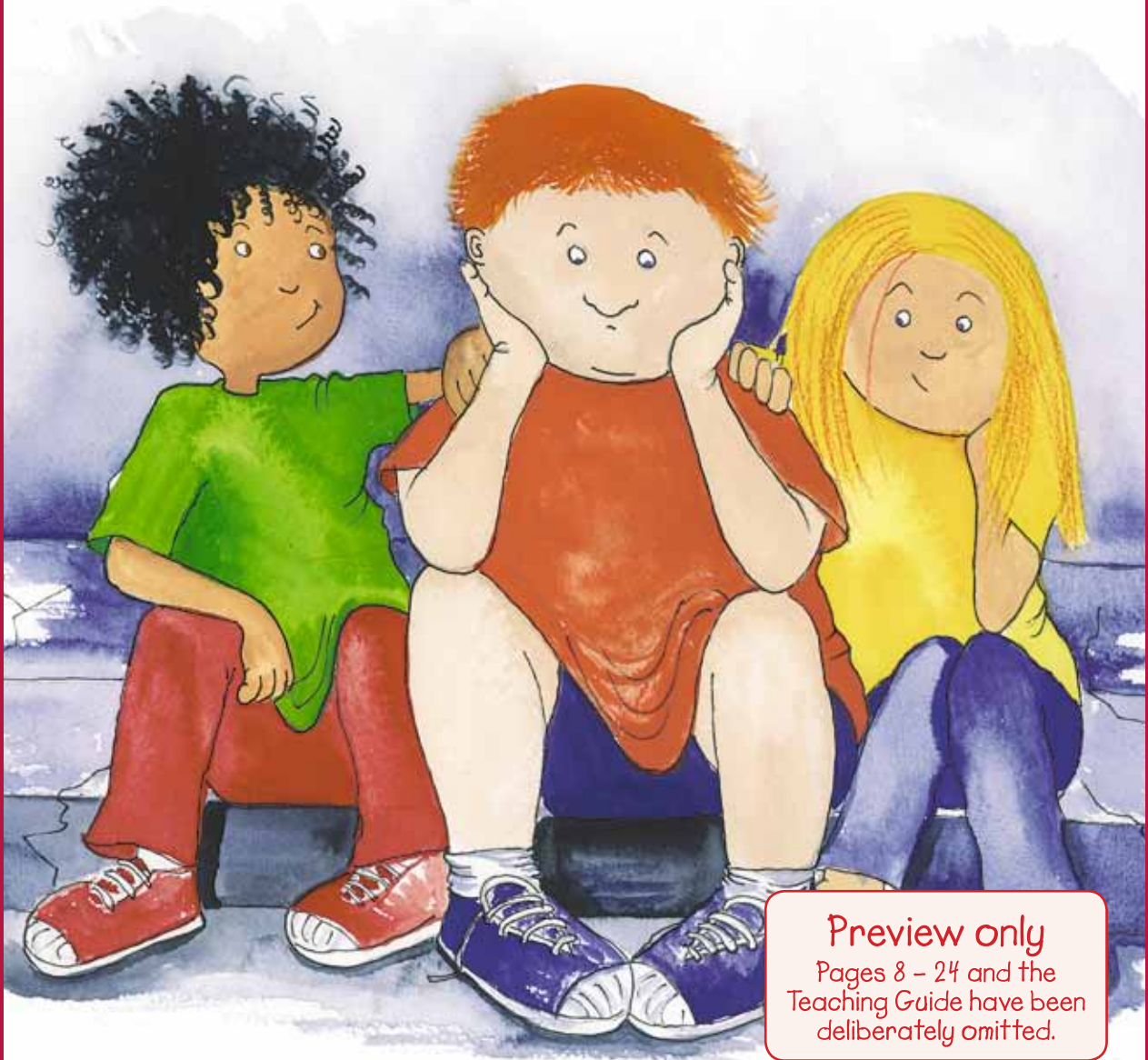

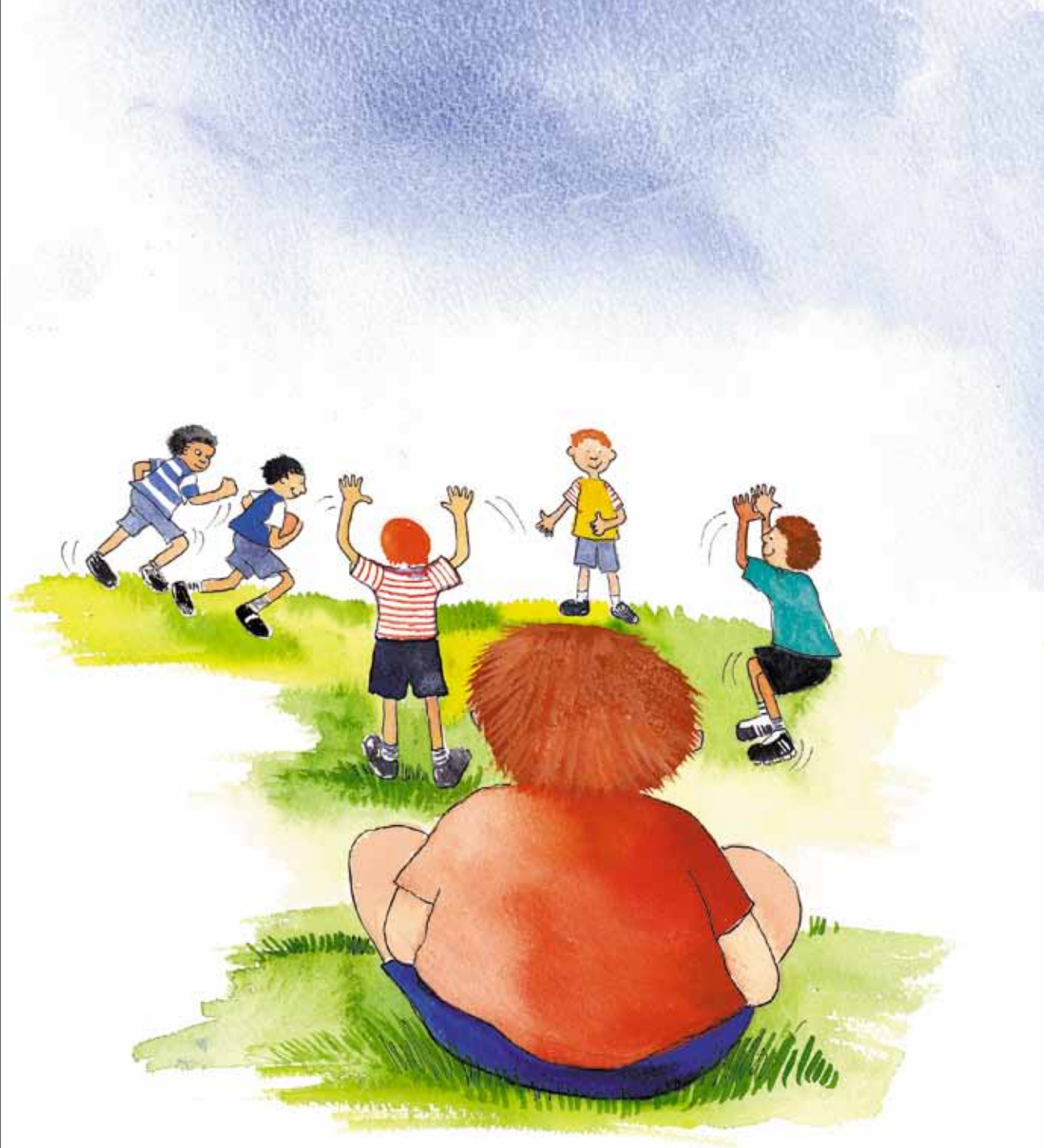
Junior Joe had the biggest smile in the school.
